#### *Individual tasks, the exam, and course-essay*

- After the study visit to Lantmännen and LRF (April 26), I will give you some keywords related to the visit and you will (individually) write a short reflection (1-2 pages) on the study visit. The reflections should be uploaded in Canvas no later than Friday, June 3.
- The guest lectures (April 19 and May 6) are compulsory to attend. This is also the case when it comes to the study visit to Lantmännen and LRF (April 26), and the course-essay seminars (May 31, and June 3)
- The exam on Tuesday, May 24, will focus on 'essay-questions', i.e., students are asked to explain/analyze/reflect upon some central issues from the course. Please note that the exam starts at 8.00 sharp! I will get back to you on details on the exam.
- Course-essay (in pairs/trios): Choose a topic, related to agricultural cooperatives, that you find interesting. Write an essay, not exceeding 7 pages, having at least the following headings (you can add 'extra headings', if you like):

  - Theoretical framework
  - Method
  - Empirical data
  - Analysis and results
  - Conclusions

## **Study visit and Course Requirements**

In connection with the study visit to Lantmännen and LRF (April 26), you should be well prepared. You should scrutinize the firms' websites (for links, see Canvas, or Google). If Lantmännen and/or LRF provide us with any written/digital material in advance, you should also read this material carefully. *During* the study visit you should be active and curious – act as journalists to find out what may interest you!

As mentioned above, it is compulsory to participate in the study visit (April 26), and the guest lectures (April 19, and May 6), and the course essay 'seminars'. If you do not meet these requirements, you will be given another task (one for each activity you have been absent from), which will be much more time consuming for you, compared to if you had participated.
